Children's Service Society of Utah (CSS) continues our 140 year legacy of serving adoptive families, birthparents, and adoptees through our ethical adoption program. While we continue to provide the ethical pre-adoption services we are known for, our commitment to supporting Utah's adoption community continues as we work to grow the post-adoption supports we offer to all members of the adoption, foster and kinship networks. In addition to our Connections program to support search and reunion, we also offer adoption-related counseling to anyone touched by adoption. We hold support groups for adult and teen adoptees, birthparents, and for adoptive families.

We are always working towards improving post-adoption resources available in the wider community. In 2023, CSS was chosen as the only Training for Adoption Competency (TAC) training site in the state of Utah. By providing TAC, an accredited curriculum developed by the Center for Adoption Support and Education that seeks to expand the adoption competency of mental health treatment providers, CSS is helping ensure that adoptive families can access adoption competent therapeutic care in their communities.

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Adoption Highlights

When Love Means Trusting Another

Early this year, we received a call from a new parent who tearfully explained that he and his spouse were considering making a plan for adoption for their child who had been born a month earlier with a genetic condition that would cause lifelong challenges. He explained that they loved their daughter, but felt overwhelmed and unprepared to support the challenges they were learning she would have. They asked if CSS would help them identify a family who would be better prepared to give their daughter the care they wished they were able to provide.

"We set out to find not just a family—but the right family."

We immediately set out to find not just "a family," but "the *right* family" for their daughter. We received many inquiries about the baby, but upon hearing about the baby's needs, many potential adoptive families felt her care would be too much to take on. One family, however, seemed to be a wonderful fit. They had a good understanding of what this infant's needs would be and with their education, professional knowledge, and background providing foster care, they felt they were well prepared to meet them. CSS coordinated an initial meeting between the birth parents and the prospective adoptive family to see if the birth parents felt this was a good fit. When the two families met, there was an instant connection. The birth family felt confident that their daughter would be safe and loved in this adoptive home. CSS continues to check in and provide the support both the birth and adoptive families feel they need. The two families stay in touch with photos, updates, and visits, and their daughter continues to grow and thrive with the love and support of her family.



Creating a Space for Healing

We opened newly renovated therapy offices to better serve the families and children. As leaders in Utah for adoption competency training and child-parent psychotherapy, we wanted to create a comfortable space for families who need post-adoption services. This new space allows us to better provide our therapeutic services for families touched by adoption.

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Care About Childcare



Care About Childcare is an online system designed in partnership with the Office of Child Care. It is intended to promote quality child care and helps parents locate licensed caregivers in their area. Care About Childcare at Children's Service Society of Utah provides resource and referral services to childcare providers in Salt Lake and Tooele Counties regions.

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Programs specific to our region are The Kids in Care (KIC) program, Refugee Start Up grant and technical assistance, and Finger Printing services. The Kids in Care program reimburses regulated child care providers for caring for children while parents engage in formal job search activities. The KIC program is for unemployed parents who meet specified financial eligibility requirements based upon federal regulations. Refugee Start up Grant provides financial and technical support to Refugees who would like to open a licensed childcare business. Finger fingerprinting services for individuals who need to be processed to work in a child care or after school setting.

Care About Childcare Highlights

National Provider Appreciation Day

Every spring, Care about Childcare celebrates Provider Appreciation Day, in which we invite Child Care Providers in Salt Lake and Tooele Counties to join us for food and fun. We celebrate their dedication, compassion, and commitment to making a difference in the lives of young children.

National Provider Appreciation Day started in 1996 in New Jersey by a group of volunteers who saw the need to recognize the tireless efforts of providers who care for children of working parents. Each year since momentum and support have grown, and recognition currently includes individual and government organizations throughout the United States. A proclamation is signed each year by many of the State Governors.

Halloween Haunt Trunk-or-Treat

During the Murray Halloween Trunk-or-Treat, over 3,000 people stopped by our Harry Potter- themed booth to receive a book, a sweet treat, and information about Children's Service Society of Utah and our programs. The event featured performances from The School of Rock Band, pictures with Star Wars characters and Disney Princesses from Characters and Crowns.

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GRANDfamilies



GRANDfamilies Kinship Care at Children's Service Society of Utah supports kinship caregivers and children by providing inclusive support services in collaboration with trusted community partners to build safe, stable, and resilient kinship families.

Youth are engaged in GRANDfamilies through psycho-educational classes, Botvin LifeSkills courses, and monthly Friend-2-Friend activities. This year, GRANDfamilies opened 9 offices in Utah: Box Elder, Cache, Davis, Salt Lake, Tooele, Uintah, Utah, Washington, Weber, and Statewide virtual services.

GRANDFamilies Highlights

Growing Our Roots

GRANDfamilies is proud to have held grand openings for four new office locations in Box Elder, Tooele, Uintah, and Utah counties, expanding our reach to better support families across Utah. These new offices serve as hubs for connecting grandparents and relatives raising children with essential resources and services. The grand openings were well-attended by our community partners, including the Division of Child and Family Services (DCFS), Utah Foster Care, local school districts, and other support agencies, as well as our kinship caregivers.

A National Model

GRANDfamilies was the recipient of the first Exemplary Program Designation through the Grandfamilies and Kinship Support Network: A National Technical Assistance Center. We are proud of this accomplishment, as it recognizes the hard work and dedication of all our staff in growing and improving necessary support services over the last 21 years.


Summer Support

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Home Visitation





The past year, HV has been able to provide opportunities of growth to not only our families but to our staff.

In November, HV staff were able to attend the Early Childhood Mental Health Summit that focused on how we as community providers can help foster a safe and secure environments for children to navigate their mental health. The conference included a keynote speaker who specializes in trauma informed care and was followed by breakout sessions. Throughout these breakout sessions, staff were able to learn essential skills that can help them provide the best possible care that HV's clients need. Not only did we learn skills, but we were able to connect with other community providers who are able to offer specialized services for our clients. It was a great opportunity for us to expand our network and to help us provide the best possible visits we can.

Home Visitation Highlight

Most families in the Home Visitation program live on low incomes and are not able to afford taking their children to museums. **Group Connection events** build community for young parents in the program by providing enriching activities outside of the home to museums, the zoo, or the aquarium. The Group Connection event at The Leonardo was one of the highest attended events. For many of the families, this was their first visit to a child-friendly museum that focused on imagination and innovation. The families were so grateful to experience this through their children's eyes!



Building Blocks



Building Blocks has had the opportunity to host a variety of community events, such as holiday parties, community days, and read-a-longs, to engage with parents and families. We've also had the privilege of celebrating the achievement of two staff members who earned a Level 3 certification on the career ladder by completing 40 hours of training.

Building Blocks has also implemented the Creative Curriculum, a research-based program aligned with Utah's core standards, and participated in a Peer Learning Community (PLC) from August 2023 to May 2024. The PLC was designed to deepen our understanding of the Environmental Rating Scales (ERS) used in the Childcare Quality Rating System (CCQS) observations, which played a key role in helping us achieve a high-quality rating for our center this year. While our initial CCQS practice observations scored below high-quality, our final assessments showed teachers consistently meeting the high-quality standard.

In addition, we completed training and successfully implemented the Ages & Stages Questionnaires (ASQ-3), conducting a total of 40 assessments.


